Key Activities

Management and Administration

RTC staff briefed the RTC Director on upcoming issues prior to the June SASS meeting. Key SASS items included a debrief on the June PSC meeting, final selection of a performance measures group, and the tolling listening sessions.

RTC staff has had ongoing participation in the regular FTA/FHWA meetings. Items included a debrief on the FTA June 4th quarterly meeting, Vancouver Work Group recommendations on McLoughlin, and progress on the PMP, Risk Assessment, and Technical Capacity reports.

The New Starts Strategy Group met in June. Several items were initiated and discussed. The NSSG confirmed that a 2018 No Build was not needed for FTA requirements. However, further discussion determined that 2018 No Build air quality hotspot analysis must be conducted for the FEIS. Regional AQ analysis is not needed. The NSSG also reviewed changes to the New Starts rating methodology proposed by FTA.

NSSG continued discussion of the schedule for PE approval and the subsequent impact on the requirement for a 2009 New Starts submittal. At this point, a new submittal is not needed. An adjustment may be necessary if the Vancouver Work Group effort results in a significant change to park and ride capacity in the bridge influence area. The NSSG also continued discussion on the shared use of BRT and LRT in downtown Vancouver. Immediate concerns had to do with the impact of additional BRT lines (to the Fourth Plain BRT) being added into the mix.

Financial Structures

Participated in conference calls and discussions with the CRC team on the tolling survey work, the outreach effort and traffic revenue technical group. RTC conducted thorough review of the stated preference (SP) survey approach and methodology and provided technical comments to CRC team, Stantec, and RSG. RTC also reiterated the importance of the need for coordination between the SP work for CRC and the travel behavior survey being led by RTC this fall.

Communications

RTC staff attended the CRC Open House at the Quay on June 24, assisted CRC staff, and answered questions/concerns from the public about the project. RTC also attended the Tolling Listening Session held at WSDOT SWR on June 30.

Transportation and Transit

RTC participated in TDM work group meetings. The Work Group reviewed the proposed trip reduction matrix. There was extensive discussion about the efficacy of the mix of strategies proposed in the draft PowerPoint presentation for SASS. The next task of the WG is to confirm the strategy mix and remove the reduction ranges in order to have a single recommendation. Additional work involved discussion between the two transit districts regarding proposed improvements to transit service, provision of park and ride capacity, and full fare reciprocity.

RTC provided documentation to the CRC team on the opening year model runs. Also worked in partnership with Metro and the CRC team to perform quality check and review opening year outputs for the model runs and prepared modeling output summaries.

The MST determined that the need for air quality runs will be limited to CO hotspot analysis for selected intersection/interchanges within the BIA.

RTC, in coordination with Metro and the MST, began discussion of what additional work or model runs may be needed to address FTA/FHWA concerns about including alternatives 2,3,4 and 5 from the DEIS into the FEIS. The process began with a review of model versions, networks, land use and zonal differences between the DEIS and the FEIS. RTC prepared refinement and coding of C-TRAN transit networks for a series of DEIS/FEIS sensitivity runs. They will be used to make the case that DEIS forecast information can be brought forward into the FEIS.
